The early church told these stories to remember God's saving work throughout the ages, as they prepared to rejoice in God's ultimate saving act in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We can do the same in our own lives. When we find ourselves in those in between times, when the world is confusing or dark and we are seeking a way forward, it's good to look back and recall the times God has brought new life or direction for us.

We all have those experiences, and as we remember these ancient salvation stories this season, we will reflect on God's presence in our own lives, too. 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Offering of Socks—Maundy Thursday, April 14

Looking ahead to Holy Week, we are trying something a little different on Maundy Thursday, April 14th, the service when we read about Jesus washing the disciples' feet. This year, in place of washing one another's feet in that worship service we will collect on offering of socks to serve one of our ministries to the homeless. Sturdy socks are often one of the most needed items requested at shelters. May these gifts express Jesus' command to love one another as he has love us.

Lutheran Disaster Response Update:

As 2021 drew to a close several counties in the state of Washington were hit by atmospheric rivers. Clallam, Skagit, and Whatcom counties were hit the hardest. Roads, bridges, public water systems, and public transportation were all affected. In Whatcom County more than 100 structures were destroyed and 500 homes damaged. Many people found themselves displaced to shelters. Governments, local non-profits, and civic groups waited patiently for the Federal Emergency Management Agency to set up shop and start writing checks to assist the communities in getting back on their feet.

The State of Washington provided aid to Whatcom County. However, the combination of State, County, City, and homeowner insurance funds is not enough to meet all of the needs of the communities. Much of the damage is not covered by insurance because it is categorized as flood damage and not everyone carries flood insurance.

ELCA's Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) partners with other organizations as part of Washington Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters (WAVOAD). WAVOAD was tasked to help provide for some needs. More than 150 homes lost their furnace ductwork which will not be repaired until at least April, due to supply chain issues. LDR was asked to provide 125 oil-filled electric space heaters. The Southwestern Washington Synod, with funds released by Bishop Rick Jaech, provided 85 of these heaters. Our friends and partners at the Episcopal Diocese of Olympia will provide an additional 40 heaters.

The heaters were picked up last week by volunteers of Whatcom Strong, a brand-new community organization, with Whatcom Emergency Management Office overseeing the process. Catholic Community Services will be doing the case management and the heaters will be distributed out of two locations, the Adventist church in Everson and the community center in Sumas. A long-term recovery committee is being formed to get all of the unmet needs of these communities addressed.

Thank you for your ongoing prayers and support for these communities in need.



Lutheran Disaster Response is the disaster response ministry of the ELCA. LDR strives to help the church continue to be church in the midst of disaster — following Christ's call to bring hope and healing to our neighbor in need. Some key areas of work include:

Providing emotional and spiritual care for people who have been affected by a disaster and for leaders who respond to a disaster

Coordinating volunteers through our local affiliates

Assisting refugees in a holistic way by meeting the varied needs of the community

Promoting disaster risk-reduction by helping communities build their assets thereby reducing the effects of likely disasters Providing long-term recovery efforts by addressing the unmet needs months or even years after a disaster strikes

LDR Impact:

Lutheran Disaster Response would not exist if it were not for the thousands, if not millions, of people who make an impact by getting involved. Whether efforts are financial support, volunteering or helping to prepare communities for disasters, lives and livelihoods are improved.




New Member Preparation Classes - March 13th, 20th, and 27th during the Sunday School hour

February Council Meeting February 8, 2022

Meeting called to order at 6:30pm.

Meeting opened with devotional from Ken Sayler and a prayer by Pastor Lynne. We read our council mission statement together and then broke into Boards.

Attendees reconvened for council meeting at 7:50pm.

Treasurer's Report (Ken Sayler)

The January report shows an income of \$27,218 with expenses of \$16,968. Ken noted the income shows higher than expected because some year-end contributions from 2021 were not able to be counted until January.

Board of Trustees (Terry Smith)

Terry explained that although a quote for new a heat pump was previously approved in the amount of \$45,318 for the sanctuary and RockSolid Teen Center, there have since been discussions that it may be better to replace all systems at the same time. An anonymous donor has volunteered to pay the entire balance for the job over the originally approved amount. The current bid for all the work (to include a 6-ton pump for the narthex, a 12-ton pump for the sanctuary/RSTC, separate control zones for all, and necessary code updates) totals approximately \$71,000. The trustees are working with the installation company and Clark PUD to receive some rebates for the work. Installation dates will follow.

The water seepage repairs at RSTC are complete and paid for.

A committee has been selected for the annual financial review and will plan a date to meet.

The Trustees also discussed ideas for helping to fund Pastor Lynne's trip to the Holy Land. Airfare to Chicago has been taken care of, and \$750 from Pastor's continuing education budget is approved for use. Council discussions included looking in to Thrivent (only provides seed money); using the Wednesday Lenten offerings to help pay (not everyone was comfortable with that idea); or holding a silent auction/fundraiser (requires a great amount of work). Ultimately, it was decided that the best approach is to simply ask for donations during a small, easy event such as an ice cream social. Erika offered to work with Pastor Lynne to plan the details.

A tech solutions guest from Online Support joined the Trustee breakout to discuss IT solutions at the church. The Trustees requested approval for the following:

- the purchase and installation of a new wireless system to boost and separate WIFI as well as
- increase security \$2400
- the setup and installation of MS365 for the entire church office \$2600 an ongoing service plan through Online Support including security monitoring and updates and overall monitoring of the health of the systems and equipment \$300/mo

A question was raised about what we would be getting for the \$300 subscription fee. It was clarified that the service is monitoring only, and does not cover hardware or service calls.

Val Moon motioned to approve the expenditure of approximately \$5,000 for setup and \$300 monthly for ongoing services. MSA

Palm Sunday service will include the palm processional.

Altar flowers for Easter will be potted tulips and daffodils. There will be a sign-up sheet for the flowers available the first week of March. Tulips or daffodils can be ordered "In Memory of ..." or "In Honor of ..." and the list of memorials will be included in the bulletin on Easter Sunday. The plants can be taken home by those who ordered them following the service.

It was asked whether we advertise in the Reflector or the Columbian for Easter service? We don't have an ad currently, but Candi noted an expense item under "Advertising" in the budget. Pastor Lynne will check with Judy to determine what that was for.

Mother's Day plans are in discussion.

Board of Education (Linda Bieker)

Val Moon has taken the lead on the nursery duties. She has arranged for subs, printed handbooks, created a sign and gone through the materials. She will be holding a short orientation for nursery volunteers in March.

Pastor Lynne is still holding adult education classes on Sunday and Wednesday mornings.

Bonnie is doing in-person Sunday School and sending lessons home for kids who can't attend. Lent plans are being worked on, including an at-home project which will be available to all families who want to participate.

Plans are being made for a walk-through story experience for all families on Easter Sunday (and possibly the public before Easter).

VBS discussions are in the works.

Family Ministry Report (Bonnie)

Bonnie has been working on the Souper Bowl of Caring service, which is Sunday the 13th and will be led by the children and youth. Reminder to bring food donations.

Please let Bonnie know if there is anything you'd like to have included in the Bethel Mid-Week update.

Pastor's Report (Pr. Lynne)

Pastor will be holding a new member orientation series for anyone who needs or wants to attend. She will cover topics including "Lutheranism 101", worship practices, ELCA basics, and synod and church details. The classes will be held at 9:00am on March 13, 20, and 27.

She will also be holding a First Communion instruction class on April 3rd.

New Business - COVID Protocols

Ken opened a Council discussion regarding Covid protocols. The main question is whether we need to make changes here, considering that cases are starting to decrease. It was noted that the synod can only make recommendations, and that we have mostly followed state guidelines in the past. It was agreed that starting February 20th, singing (with masks) will be added back to the service. Beginning March 1st, food and coffee hour will be reintroduced. This means that the March BLCW brunch and Lenten soup suppers would both be allowed. The council will continue to monitor the situation, and masks will be required in the church until the state lifts the indoor mask mandate.

Closing (Ken S.)

Next meeting will be March 8th.

Closed with the Lord's Prayer.

MSA to adjourn at 8:35pm.

An Invitation from Messiah

--Members of Messiah's Jubilee Collective community will be hosting a weekly study this Lenten season and invite you to participate. They will be reading Leigh Finke's book, Welcoming and Affirming, a Guide to Supporting and Working with LGBTQ+ Christian Youth, Thursdays, March 3 - April 7. Sessions will be via Zoom at 5:30p (PT). A reading and topic schedule is listed at https://messiahvancouver.org/Messiah-Happenings/entry/Everyone-welcome-at-lenten-study-offered-by-members-of-jubilee-collective.

Welcoming and Affirming is for anyone who wants to learn more about LGBTQ+ people and create space and relationships (especially with youth) that reflect the unconditional love of God and celebration of LGBTQ+ identities in a Christian context. It will also be an opportunity to familiarize oneself with LGBTQ terminology, including what that acronym itself stands for, why many LGBTQ+ folks use the term queer, why pronouns are important, how to handle difficult conversations, and how to be an ally for queer adults and youth.

Various members of the collective will lead the sessions each week. For example, pastoral intern Jae will lead a session on the bible verses historically used to ostracize and condemn the LGBTQ + community of believers. The reading will also reveal passages that affirm the presence of queer identities and relationships within the scriptures. Supplemental videos and articles will be included in the sessions, but participant conversation will be the primary goal and substance of the sessions.
